"The right to wear The Citadel class ring ("The Ring") must be earned by study, great sacrifice and loval service. Closely guarding this right is necessary and reasonable. In the eyes of Citadel Alumni, the standard is exceptionally high and must be rigorously imposed. Nothing in this policy is intended to infer otherwise. Extremely strong justification is required to authorize anyone, other than an eligible alumnus, to be awarded the ring."




Welcome, Parents!
